






RECIPE LEMON LUSH

This recipe is a Federation Favourite. Put in a shallow bowl/glass or individual bowls.

12 sponge fingers ½ pint/300 ml double cream 5 oz/150g Greek style yogurt 3 tbsp lemon curd 12 tbsp fresh orange juice Juice and zest of 1 lemon



Method

Either divide the fingers between dishes or put all into a bowl. Sprinkle the orange

juice over the sponge fingers. Place the cream in a mixing bowl, add the lemon juice and zest, then whisk until soft peak stage. Stir together the yogurt and lemon curd in a separate bowl. And fold into the cream. Spoon over the soaked sponges and put into fridge until ready to serve. Chill for at least 30 minutes. Decorate with lemon slices, grated chocolate or chopped nuts.

How The Hornblower Began

A county newsletter had always been a supplement to the WIs "Home & Country" magazine, and the Federation also sent out a monthly letter. It cost 4d per copy, one copy was sent out free to each WI with a star marking the special notes to be read out to members! Over the years other Federations had started producing their own newsletters but in 1970 the Editor of the Home & Country announced that the supplement was to be discontinued, and something therefore had to be done to



keep the members informed. The Executive (Trustees) decided to trial their own monthly newsletter for 12 months. They changed the format of the monthly letter and by making it available to all members they hoped it would widen the field of communication so that members were no longer dependent on what the President chose to read out! **Mrs Margaret Towers**, a member of the Trustees at that time suggested the title of **The Hornblower**, taken from the Horn at the centre of the County Badge and so it was born with the first edition being printed in **January 1971**. The horn blower's job is to gather people together, as in the story of Robin Hood. The trustees also wished the Federation's voice to be heard in all corners of the county – not to blow their own trumpet, but to keep members informed of the work and events of the Federation and committees.
